We will then ask any of our existing parents to vote for their preferred governor, via an email, stating their preference. The email **must** be sent from the email address you have registered with the school to be counted. To stand, propose, assent or vote in the election, a parent must be the parent of a child who is a registered pupil at the School at the date of the election. For the purposes of the election, the term "*parent*" includes any person who has parental responsibility for a child and any person with whom a child is living and who has care of him or her. As Headteacher of Ramsey Grammar School, I am the Returning Officer for the election. Each parent/carer of a child on role has a vote, but please note it is only one vote per parent/carer in the family, and not one per child on roll at RGS.

Uniform Refocus from March 31st 2022

We are now heading towards the end of the Isle of Man Government Covid mitigations put in place for schools, to make allowances for ventilated classes during the colder winter months. With the promise of warmer weather coming our way we would like to remind all parents, carers and students that our full school uniform will be enforced from March 31st 2022. This means extra visible layers that have been allowed over winter, such as non-school uniform jumpers or hoodies etc are no longer to be worn by students. Students are very welcome to wear the plain black school jumper under their blazers still if they wish of course.

As a reminder, the expectation is for black full-length trousers, knee-length shorts, or skirts (reaching the same length as your fingers tips when hands are by your side), a white collared shirt or blouse, a black v-neck sweater (optional with a blazer, not instead of a blazer), black school blazer with RGS logo, and RGS school tie. If skirts are worn, tights are to be black or flesh coloured (any denier), without rips or holes present. Black, Grey or white socks. School shoes should be black, and should not be trainers.

A list of items that are not considered school uniform, even if they're in the correct colour: Leggings, denim, cropped or $\frac{3}{4}$ length trousers, items with logos other than the RGS logo, footwear with coloured logos, flashing lights, tabs, laces, straps or trims.

Odd Socks Day – Monday 21st March 17 2022

This coming Monday we are encouraging all students to wear a pair of mismatched or 'odd' socks. The brighter and more mismatched the better. This is in recognition of World Down Syndrome Awareness day and the purpose of wearing odd socks is to highlight and celebrate diversity and the differences that make us all unique in this world. Students are asked to wear their school uniform as usual, with the exception of their socks!



In Textile Technology, year 10 have recently completed their Bomber Jackets,. They are now having a free choice and have chosen a variety of items to make from waistcoats, skirts, cushions, jogging bottoms.


Year 8 have been designing and making a character fleece hat. This has involved hand stitch embroidery, machine stitching, using paper patterns and cutting out their fabric, making their own paper patterns for detail like ears.



In ICT the 10 students have been preparing for their Mocks. They have had one for ICT & Computer science. In the Autumn term we have focused on How computers work which relates to both ICT and Computer science and then moved on the Programming in Python which is a Computer Science topic included to help give them an introduction to programming. Before half term Y9 completed a spreadsheet module which main aim is to help them prepare for BTEC ICT should they choose it in Y10. This half term they are studying a new KS3 topic of Databases. This is again useful for preparing to study BTEC ICT but also a topic that is covered in the iGCSE Computer science offered at KS4. During this half term they are looking and why and where databases are used and how to use them.
