Department Update – English

Recently in English, our Year 8 classes have been working hard to prepare a presentation of their learning. This is an exciting opportunity at the end of the term for them to present their learning to all in the West Hall. They have been studying English language and literature through the topic of the natural world. We can't wait to see what they come up with.



Our Year 11 students are coming to the end of an intensive revision

course looking closely at each exam question for a week and then moving on to the next exam question. This, alongside their own independent revision, is aimed at placing them in the best possible position to achieve well in their exams after Easter. We know they're going to have a busy Easter with all their revision but we wish them all the best for the upcoming exam period.

Our Year 13 students have also been spending their time revising and practising exam questions in preparation for their exams. They have developed their literary analytical skills so much over the last two years and they should be proud of all they have already achieved.

Department Update – History

Year 7 – Are continuing to do their depth study on the Romans. Students are now focussing on the Romans in Britain. Highlight – Producing posters showing a Journey through Rome in 200CE. Below are Britteney, Emily, Florence, Zoe and Amelia of 7A with their Journey through Rome posters.







Year 8 – Students have now completed their work on the Early Modern period and are starting to move onto industrial Britain c1750 to c1900. In this unit they will look at topics like the British Empire, the Industrial Revolution and the lives of enslaved Africans. Highlight – To finish off their work on the Early Modern period, students produced leisure booklets for the Tudors & Stuarts. To the right are Daniel and

George of 8C with their Tudor & Stuart project.

Year 9 – Students are now looking at the early stages of WWII and in particular are looking at Dunkirk and asking if it was a Triumph or a Disaster? Highlight – Looking at the role of the IOMSPCo at Dunkirk.



Year 10 - IGCSE students have finished their mocks and the Germany depth studying part of the course. They are now looking at Unit 1 of their IGCSE which is "Were the Peace Treaties 1919-1923 fair? Highlight – Completing mocks. Students are now waiting for their results.

Year 11- Students are looking at the Paths to War unit and are busy revising. With that in mind please see the attached poster showing revision sessions, which are in room 204, every Monday at lunchtime. Highlight – Revising for the exams in early May.

Year 12 – Students have now finished looking at British society, politics and the economy in the 1960s. They are now moving on to Britain in the 1970s. Students are looking at events in the Soviet Union in the 1920s and 1930s. Highlight – Mr Wilkinson's impression of Harold Wilson.

Year 13 - Students are working on the finishing touches to their coursework either linked to the Cold War or Woman's suffrage. In the warfare course, they are starting to look at the First World War Highlight – Knowledge quiz on the American Civil War, the wars of Unification, British colonial wars, the Second Anglo-Boer War and the Russo-Japanese War.
