
# Headteacher's Message

... Achievement Points were awarded across the school this week! That brings us to a total of ... for this term which is fantastic! Well done to everyone working so hard both in and out of lessons!



## **Department Update – History**

Year 7 – Are continuing to do their depth study on the Romans. Lessons have focussed on Gladiators and Julius Caesar. Students did extremely well in their Discoveries Knowledge Assessment Quiz.

Highlight – Many students were taught about the Roman Army by ex-RGS student Jake Cowley.

Year 8 – Students are close to completing their work on the early modern period c1500 – c1750. They looked at the Civil War, the execution of Charles I and whether Oliver Cromwell was a good guy... or not.

*Highlight – Many students were taught by Edge Hill PGCE student Josh Abley.* 

Year 9 – Students have continued to look at Europe between the wars and they asked the question 'Could Hitler have been stopped?' They also started to look at the early part of WWII and prepare for their 'Tell Me' project assessment task.

*Highlight – Project on Life on the Home Front in WW2.*

**Year 10** - IGCSE students are close to finishing their work on Germany 1918 – 1945. They are now preparing for their mocks.

## Highlight – Discussing the Holocaust and trying understand why it occurred.

**Year 11**- Students are coming to the end of the course and are preparing for a special mock to help them with Paper 2 on "Soviet control in Eastern Europe". Very topical!

## Highlight - Discussing parallels between Soviet controls and Putin's Russia,

**Year 12** - students have done their first essay on Britain 1951 – 1964 and are now looking at Britain in the 1960s. In the Russian topic we are about to look at the methods employed by Stalin in his bid for power in the second half of the 1920s and will be moving on to looking at life in Stalin's Russia in the 1930s – the grim reality!

## Highlight – Listening to music of The Kinks and The Who.

**Year 13** - students have continued working on their coursework either linked to the Cold War or Woman's suffrage. The deadline for this was February half-term. In the warfare course, they are looking at the wars of unification in Germany & Italy and the Boer War.


## Highlight – Receiving mock results.
