Year 7 – Students are now looking at the Middle Ages and asking if life was "short, bloody and hard". We will look at areas such as the events of 1066, life in villages & towns and the Crusades and we will finish the year by comparing the Black Death of 1348 to Covid 19. Students also completed their exam where they answered a question about the legacy of the Roman Empire. Year 9 – Students are completing their studies on WW2, with a special focus on the Holocaust. Unfortunately due to Covid in the History Department, the trip to Mooragh Promenade Internment Camp had to be cancelled. Students have also produced memorials for ex-RGS Students who died in WW2 (see Bella Kerruish's example below). Students also completed their exam where they answered a question about Dunkirk. Students have now made their IGCSE choices and we are delighted that so many Year 9 students decided to study history. We are very excited about our new IGCSE course and are looking forward to teaching it in September.

Highlight – Discussing the Holocaust in P4C sessions.

Year 10 - IGCSE students have been working on their Coursework and asking the question. "How far was the tourist industry significant on the economy and society of the Isle of Man 1850 -1914." Parents and carers are usually a big help here, please read draft essays and give constructive criticism.

Highlight – Looking forward to the trip to Douglas on Monday 18 July to help complete their coursework Year 11.

Year 12 – Students have now finished their Unit 1 and Unit 2 work on Britain and Russia. They have started their Unit 3 work on Warfare 1792-1945 and are choosing their Coursework titles

Highlight - Receiving their mock results.

We hope that everyone will have a wonderful summer and that you'll get the chance to visit lots of historical locations either on the Island or abroad.

As the academic year draws to a close, we say goodbye and good luck to our examination students. Hopefully – like Year 13's Ellie – some of our students will continue to pursue a career in Drama and the Performing Arts. Others won't, but studying Drama will have equipped them with the essential skills (previously called 'soft skills') required in almost all work-based settings. Perhaps this is best summed up by the comedian and actor Peter Kay, who wrote in his autobiography:

"I've always believed Drama to be an important subject. It's not just about play-acting; it's about giving children confidence and ironing out their inhibitions. I realise that most of them may never go near a stage again once they've left school, but I guarantee that they'll exude confidence for the rest of their lives as a result of being taught Drama."

As our students head out into the world of higher education or employment, by studying Drama they will have developed the ability to work as a part of a team; to agree to differ; to work to a time limit; to present themselves and their work with confidence, as well as channelling their creativity and productivity.
