As Miss Will said, it is a weighty task to be completely trustworthy in all the many ways every second of every day, and whilst nobody is perfect 100% of the time, we continue to have high expectations of our students via the RGS Ways of Being, and applaud them for hitting the mark far more often that they probably realise.

We have had a glowing write-up of our students sent into us by a member of the public, and organizer of the Manx Fell Runners group that we wanted to share with the rest of our school community. The letter stated: "This year, the Year 10/11 team of Samuel Perry, Charlie Teare and Dominic Dunwell improved on last year's team bronze to claim a team silver which given the standard of competition was a fantastic achievement. Samuel Perry did brilliantly to claim an individual bronze in a very close finish. Individual medals are very hard to win at this event as they are competing against the best fell runners in England, including several national class athletes. Lucas Stennett was unfortunately injured but travelled regardless to support the squad. They were not to be outdone by the Year 12/13 girls team of Madison McMullan, Catherine Perry and Lottie Stennett though who also won team silver. Catherine sadly bows out of the event this year after competing for several years but is keen to support the squad at future events.

In the younger age groups, Timothy Perry had an excellent debut run, finishing well up the top third of the year 7 field. Harry Stennett excelled in his race in claiming fourth which was particularly impressive given he was competing alongside older year 9 athletes. Both show great potential for future championships.

Sporting achievements aside though I really wanted to express what a credit to your school these students are. They represent the Isle of Man impeccably at the event but also outside of competition. The Isle of Man Schools squad are made particularly welcome at the event and are singled out each year for not only their performances but also how they conduct themselves. The group support each other brilliantly and readily muck in where any help is required.

In times where the younger generation are too often maligned it is important to give credit where it is due and that is very much the case here. The school, teachers and parents should be very proud of their roles in developing such an impressive group of individuals.

# **Mobile Phone Use in School**

Please remind your child that mobile phone use within the buildings is prohibited, unless a teacher has instructed that they can be used for a set task within a lesson. Teachers will usually issue the student with a warning, asking them to put it away during lessons. If this isn't heeded the teacher may remove the phone for the remainder of the lesson, and the student can retrieve it at the end of that lesson. Any phones being used in hallways or public spaces such as the canteen in either building, will have their phone removed until the end of the day when they are to collect it from either the West of East Office (depending where they were when it was confiscated), and sign the phone out upon receipt. Phones may be used when outside the buildings on campus without issue – but we kindly ask that the appropriate use of phones, vidoes and cameras be discussed regularly in order to help keep our young people on the right track.
