RGS Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme



As we approach the end of the current academic year, we start planning the registration process for the next cohort embarking on the Duke of Edinburgh Awards Scheme within RGS. This may be the new Year 9 Students, or students progressing onto the Silver or Gold Awards. We can look back on another successful year of expeditions and many students nearing the completion of their current awards.

This year has seen over **100 students** complete their expedition section of the award, trekking around the fantastic routes we have on offer around the North and West of the Island. The groups have all shown commitment and dedication whilst completing their expeditions, being challenged by the route, carrying their own kit and supplies, camping out and, of course, the Manx weather - from starting and finishing in the glorious sunshine, to starting in heavy rain and thunder with hail showers. This never put the groups off, they dug deep and pushed themselves through those awful conditions, until the better weather arrived and gave them a well-earned boost.

This year has also seen our largest Bronze Award Cohort with 95 students registering for the award - 68 of those have completed their expeditions and are well on the way to completing their award. There are some students waiting to complete their expedition early in the next academic year. We also have an increased number of students progressing onto the Silver Award, with 33 completing their expedition and, again, a few to catch up in September 2024.



We are delighted to have had 6 Gold Award students complete their expedition over 4 tough days on some unfamiliar paths/tracks around the Island. The group

showed great teamwork, resilience, commitment, and dedication to successfully complete the expedition. Some of the groups also completed their residential sections at Knockaloe Beg. The students really enjoyed their week and felt part of the family - helping to do farm tasks, looking after the newly born lambs, shop work and other tasks that were asked of them, and they would do it again if they had the chance.

The current Year 8 students have had a little insight to the Duke of Edinburgh Awards Scheme from an Assembly that took place a few weeks ago. They will be able to begin their DofE journey in September 2024. Registration, cost and training details will be sent out to all parents/carers during the first week back after the summer break. We look forward to welcoming them onto the Award and hope to, again, increase the number of students working towards the Award.

The current Year 9 students who completed their Bronze award can register for the Silver award from August, as we plan to have a practice expedition before the October 2024 half term break - dates will be confirmed at the end of the first week of the new term.

During Standalone, Ms. Ferguson and Mrs. Jones worked with some very diligent students to report on the activities held during the week. Below are some of the highlights from their hard work.

Writing Concisely - Students were taught the importance of brevity in reporting. They practiced:

- Summarising lengthy information into key points.
- Using precise language to convey their messages effectively.
- Eliminating unnecessary words to improve readability.

Eye-Catching Headlines - Creating headlines that grab attention was a key focus. The students learned to:

- Use strong, action-oriented words.
- Keep headlines short and impactful.
- Use a range of techniques to make headlines interesting.

Photography Skills - To complement their writing, students were instructed on:

- Capturing moments that tell a story.
- Clarity and focus.

Developing Interview Skills - Interviewing is crucial for gathering information and quotes. Students practiced:

- Preparing thoughtful and relevant questions.
- Listening actively and following up for more depth.
- Quoting sources accurately and ethically.
- Identifying and logging direct and indirect speech.

Activities of the Week - Here are some highlights of the activities reported by the students:

- 1. Trip to the Fun Farm
- 2. Army Cadet Visit
- 3. Baking
- 4. Sports Activities

By learning and applying these reporting skills, students not only documented the week's activities but also gained valuable experience in journalism, communication and creating their own website. Their efforts have been commendable, and the results speak volumes about their dedication and creativity.
