Knowledge to be Assessed:

Students have been studying the religion of Islam – the beliefs and practices of Muslims. The Pillars of Islam are the five things that all Muslims believe are essential aspects of living your life in submission to Allah. Students will have looked at each pillar in depth, looking at how they are followed and why they are considered essential:


Shahadah – the declaration of Islamic faith.

Salah – the five daily prayers.

Zakat – annual giving of 2.5% of earnings to the poor and needy.

Sawm – Fasting during the month of Ramadan.

Hajj – Pilgrimage to Mecca once in a lifetime.
